Tribute to Jim Harrington

Dad was born on the North Brink in Wisbech He was the 9th of 10 children, the 6th of 7 boys! Dad loved telling stories about his childhood and would often remind us how lucky we were to enjoy so much comfort. For him the water would be collected from a well at the bottom of the garden and also from the roof. He had the unenviable task of checking the water store for any rodents that may have slipped in! The toilet was outside where they had the newspaper cut into squares and held on a piece of string. This probably goes some way to explaining his obsession with toilet paper usage when we were growing up.

But despite those hardships, Dad grew up in a loving home and he said it taught him the value of things and the importance of family, which was central to the values he both taught, and more pertinently, demonstrated to us throughout his life.

Having completed his primary school education in Wisbech, Dad headed off to St Joseph's College in Ipswich. He excelled in Maths and represented the school at Cricket, Hockey and was captain of the Rugby team.

Dad did his National Service and spent time in Germany. Latterly he was based in Berlin with the Intelligence Corps, gathering and analysing military intelligence on Russian activities in East Germany.

He decided a military career was not for him and returned home and joined Campbell's Soups as a Salesman covering North London. The bright lights of London were where he wanted to be at that stage, and he was able to indulge in his love of live jazz. Ronnie Scotts was a favourite and he saw his favourite singer there, Ella Fitzgerald.

Between leaving the army and even when at London, Dad would spend time back home in Wisbech. It was during this time that he met a family who hadn't been in the area all that long. Harold and Winnie Healey were living locally with their four children, the second of which was a young lady by the name of Patricia. They fell in love and in November 1964 they got married and moved into their new home in Hatfield. The only furniture they had at that point was a kitchen table and a bed ... little wonder I arrived just over 10 months later!

Dad continued developing his career with Campbell's Soups and an opportunity arose to



join the marketing department which brought him to Kings Lynn. His work entailed several trips to the US, and he had many happy memories of these. Being a Campbell's employee in the US was pretty close to being royalty at the time. Dad would use us four children as guinea pigs for Campbell's Soups and, when working on a new range called *Soups of the World*, he even got our opinions printed on the soup can labels.

Dad had a deep insight into the issues of the world around him - he could talk for hours about the state of the world and business - especially anything to do with soup. However, this did not extend into the creative side of the brain – that was Mum's domain.

What we remember best is Dad's attitude to life and his unquestioning support and love for us all. He had a great sense of fairness – he believed in treating everyone the same regardless of background. He always said he didn't have a problem with people being wealthy - it was what they did with their wealth that was important.

No man would have looked after their wife with as much care and love as Dad looked after our mum when she fell ill. It was extremely difficult for him to admit that eventually he needed help, having kept her at home far longer than normally possible. And then, when in care, not a day would pass when he wouldn't be spending hours with Mum taking her out on trips and for lunches.

Whenever he would introduce any of us to someone, subconsciously we would feel at least a foot taller. Not from any words he used, just the way he spoke, we could feel the pride and warmth. Father, I hope you know just how proud we all are to call you our Dad.






Pope Francis goes to Russian embassy to express concern

Pope Francis spent more than a half-hour at the Russian embassy on the Via della Conciliazione in Rome on Friday morning. A day earlier, Cardinal Pietro Parolin appealed for greater space for negotiations.





Prayer for Ukraine

The financial returns for 2021 have now been completed and sent to Diocese. I thought that rather than doing a standard report on the year, parishioners might appreciate a review of how our finances were affected by the pandemic and how we have recovered. The attached table shows the changes in the parish finances since 2019 (pre pandemic) through 2020 (main lockdown) and into 2021(start of recovery).

In terms of parish income, a drop of £15000 occurred in 2020, principally through the reduction in collection income because the churches were closed. This also affected the income received from people and groups who use the premises. Donations remained high over these years and were helped by a very generous donation in 2019 which enabled us to buy St Joseph's House (96 London Rd), and in 2020 by two generous legacies which have enabled us to begin the renovation of these premises.

Last year's generous response to the stewardship campaign has meant we have recovered our offertory income, despite the congregations being limited for a large part of the year. We also had the benefit of an unexpected back payment from HMRC. One area of income that we will need to replace in future years is the income from Faith. Alive in Our 5-year commitment finished recently, so the element of this programme which was given back to the parish is drawing to an end.

In terms of expense, these have stayed manageable over the last 3 years. There has been an increase in priest's costs over the years as Father Gordon has become an official priest of the parish, but the major cost is associated with buildings. One of the reasons for this is the renovation of St Joseph's House, which will continue throughout this year, but we are also subject, as everybody else is, to the ever-increasing cost of gas and electricity.

This is only a brief report of the state of parish finances. A more detailed report is available for inspection in the presbytery by prior arrangement with Father Peter. An annual report, on the Parish financial situation and budget, is sent to Diocese early each year, with a six-month report in September.

Our Lady of Walsingham Secular Carmelite Group

Starting on Saturday 19th February our Secular Carmelite group, currently with six to eight members, will be meeting at the Church of Our Lady of the Annunciation. The group - with the name 'Our Lady of Walsingham' - was formed more than twenty years ago and has been meeting regularly for over a decade in Walsingham village. We have decided to move to King's Lynn to make meetings more accessible for members, most of whom live in 'West Anglia'.

As Secular Carmelites we are lay people within the Discalced Carmelite Order devoted to learning how to pray and serve the Lord in the spirit of Carmel. This involves us in shared prayer and study in local groups and in a commitment to a personal prayer life.

The writings of the Carmelite saints, for example St Teresa of Avila, St John of the Cross and St Thérèse of Lisieux, offer a great treasury of wisdom and experience available to everyone who wants to draw closer to God. Our purpose is to absorb their spirit in our daily lives as laypersons living in the world.

We do not take monastic vows but we make promises – involving a commitment to living in allegiance to Christ, to be worked out through contemplative prayer and activity in the service of the Church.

We will usually be meeting on the third Saturday of each month, from 10.30 to mid afternoon. Our time will be spent in prayer, reflection on Scripture and study of the writings of the Carmelite saints. We'll also be attending the morning Mass and sharing lunch together.

We are all very much looking forward to this new phase in our group's life and are very grateful to Father Peter for agreeing to host us in this way.



Quidenham Stations of the Cross Booklet https:// quidenhamcarmel.org.uk/

Accompany Jesus on the Via Dolorosa with our Carmelite Stations of the Cross Booklet. The Stations of the Cross (Via Crucis) is a series of images depicting the Passion of Jesus from his condemnation until he is laid in the tomb. The Stations grew out of imitations of the Via Dolorosa in Jerusalem which is believed to be the actual path Jesus walked to Mount Calvary. Prayers are said at each of the fourteen Stations to facilitate a spiritual pilgrimage through contemplation of the Passion of Christ.

Our booklet features images of the Stations of the Cross in our chapel at the Carmelite Monastry, Quidenham. For each Station there is a scripture text and meditations by Carmelite saints and our Sisters. Between each of the first ten Stations are verses from poems by Blessed Titus Brandsma, a Dutch Carmelite priest who died in Dachau, and between the last four Stations are verses from poems by St John of the Cross. A fifteenth Station of the Resurrection is also included as an invitation to enter more deeply into the risen life of Jesus.

The A5 booklet is printed on high quality gloss paper, with colour images throughout.

A Cotswold Mystery - Part 2 - by John Cairns

Summary of Part 1: The events in my story took place in the Cotswolds, at Chipping Campden, in the early 1660s. It involves the disappearance of the 70-year-old William Harrison, unreliable witness accounts trying to explain his disappearance and happenings regarding which no satisfactory explanation has ever been found.



The Perrys were telling the truth. About a year after they were hanged, William Harrison returned to Chipping Campden alive and well.

Where had he been in the two years? He claimed that he had been robbed and kidnapped by two men on horseback. As he struggled to escape, Harrison claimed he was stabbed in his thigh and side.

After this, he says he was sold for £7 to a group who dealt in human trafficking. Placed aboard a ship for six weeks, presumably be sold into slavery, he was nursed back to health on the voyage. However, the slave ship was attacked near North Africa by Turkish pirates, who took Harrison and everyone on board and sold them into slavery. Harrison claimed he was sold to an elderly doctor in Smyrna (modern day Izmir, Turkey).



His time as an assistant to the doctor was not long. After about a year his new master died. After his death, he claimed that he used a silver bowl his master had given him to buy his passage on a Portuguese ship. Arriving in Portugal, he met a fellow Englishman who took pity on him and gave him money for his food and voyage back to England.



While this sort of kidnapping was not unusual, the idea of someone choosing to kidnap a man about 70 years old is generally considered rather suspect. Certainly, the rent money he was carrying would have been worth the robbery, but the trouble and additional risk in transporting and selling him as a slave would hardly have been worth the £7, they supposedly got for him.

Because of this, it is thought that perhaps he simply left Campden with the money he had been collecting for his master, leaving the bloodied items behind to make people think he had been killed. However, Sir Thomas Overbury, who tried the Perrys, notes that this seems unlikely given the elderly Harrison was reasonably well-off already. He also had not taken with him any of the money he had accumulated over his own lifetime. Besides, he was well respected and had a good reputation in the area around Campden. He always seemed happy in his job, even up to his disappearance.

Sir Thomas Overbury speculated that someone may have hired the kidnappers to attack Harrison, which might explain why such an elderly person was kidnapped. Sir Thomas thought the prime suspect in that scenario would perhaps have been Harrison's son, hoping to get Harrison's job, though even this stretches belief given the known facts of the case.

Intriguingly, a couple weeks before Harrison's disappearance, John Perry reported being attacked along the road by two men wielding swords, but he eventually managed to escape. However, during the interrogation for Harrison's murder, he changed his story and said he had concocted the story to remove suspicion from himself and his family.

Whatever really happened, despite Sir Thomas Overbury noting that some at the time thought Harrison's story farfetched, there does not seem to be any evidence of anyone interrogating Harrison further about events. Moreover, he was given his old job back and he resumed his duties.

There was a public outcry that the justice system had executed three people for the murder of William Harrison when he had not been murdered at all. It is often stated that, because of this injustice, the English courts brought in a new criminal rule 'No body, no murder' - a law that supposedly stayed in place for about three centuries.

However, there is no such record of any such specific 'no body, no murder' law being instituted and there are certainly plenty of cases of people being convicted of murder in England when no body was found. Any such law would also have created a huge loophole to allow criminals to get away with murder - they would have just needed to hide the remains, which would not have been difficult.



Busy times ahead at the Foodbank?

As you might expect, King's Lynn Foodbank has been busy during the winter months as people who are already struggling to make ends meet find their income stretched even further. The number of clients that we see usually peaks in December and then settles down again by Easter, however this year we're bracing ourselves ready to be busy throughout the coming year.

The country is currently facing the perfect economic storm. From April, National Insurance contributions will increase and the energy price cap will rise by £693, which is a 54% increase. The Resolution Foundation forecasts that energy bills will become unaffordable for 27% of households, and the poorest households may have to spend half their income on energy.

In February inflation levels were put at 5.5% - the highest in nearly 30 years. However, this doesn't reflect the massive increases in food prices of the cheapest food items. Jack Monroe is an author who has used Foodbanks in the past and has followed food prices in close detail for the last ten years. She recently laid out how the prices of "value" product ranges in supermarkets had soared – rice in her local supermarket had increased in price from 45p for a kilogram bag last year, to £1 for 500g, a 344% increase – and how the number of value products has shrunk dramatically. More and more we're seeing people who are working hard but finding that prices are outpacing their income.

So where does this leave us now? What of the future?

Our vision of the future is one where there is no need for a Foodbank. As Archbishop Desmond Tutu said:

"There comes a point where we need to stop just pulling people out of the river. We need to go upstream and find out why they're falling in."

Whilst the first ten years of King's Lynn Foodbank was focused almost entirely on 'pulling people out of the river' by simply providing them with food, recently we've turned our focus to also figure out and do something about why they're falling into the river in the first place. For the last year we've employed our own CAB worker so that we can ensure that our clients have quick access to benefit checks and get referred to organisations for debt advice and other issues which may be causing their crisis. Of those referred clients, only 10% have returned for further food parcels.

This year we're looking to employ our own signposter to add to this work and ensure that nobody gets missed. We're also hoping to employ someone to do more in depth research into the drivers of poverty locally so that we can work ever more closely with the Borough and County Councils to ensure that there is help in place to prevent people falling into crisis. As always, we can't do this without the continued support of our local community through prayer and other practical support.

Thank you for all you do to help the Foodbank – it really does make such a difference to local people.

Bishop Alan launches Synodal Pathway online survey

Bishop Alan Hopes launched the online survey of the Diocesan Listening Project, 'The Synodal Pathway' on Sunday November 28. Angela Wilson, part of the Synodal Pathway Team, explains.

The Synodal Pathway, which began in the Diocese of East Anglia on Sunday October 17, has taken another step along the way with the launch of the online survey by Bishop Alan.

We are being asked specifically to explore ten main themes, which cover a lot of issues, but there is one unifying theme: how can the Church better fulfil her mission of offering hope to ALL people? Each person's contribution will be valued, but you do not need to answer every question posed, they are there to guide the discussions.

Pope Francis is using this worldwide listening exercise to prepare for a Synod of Bishops in Rome in 2023, so the responses from our Diocese will go forward to the worldwide Synod, but will also be used in our own Diocese as part of a pastoral plan of renewal.

Parishes are invited to gather in small group meetings to discuss these questions with each other and then to respond individually via the online survey, which can be found on the rcdea.org.uk website and linked on parish websites.

It is not so much a matter of sharing opinions; it is much deeper. We are being invited into a process of personal renewal and of listening to God with humility, as disciples of Jesus on a pilgrim journey through life, both as individuals, but also as part of God's family.

So we are not only listening to the Holy Spirit speaking to us in our hearts, but also speaking to us

through our brothers and sisters. Respectful, attentive listening to their insights will strengthen our bonds of charity. As we journey together, we are walking on the path with Christ, who reveals to us the truth of our lives and who gives us life in Him. Every Christian shares this prophetic office with Christ and each of us shares His mission, the mission of the Church.

At the heart of the listening process are three words which Pope Francis has chosen as the theme of the Synod:

Communion, Participation, Mission

As sons and daughters of the one Father, we are in **communion** with each other. We are members of the Body of Christ, Jesus, and we are temples of the Holy Spirit.

Participation means our participation as missionary members of the Church. Each member of God's family needs to discern how they can contribute to building up the Church.

Mission is the purpose of the Church. Jesus died to take away our sins and bring us to eternal life. New evangelisation involves re-proposing the Gospel to a society that has been profoundly influenced by Christianity, but whose members have fallen into indifference and scepticism.

The Synodal Team hope that our Diocesan family will take this opportunity to be part of the renewal that began with Vatican II, and which continues to shape the Church in the 21st century.

Responses from participants should be submitted by Tuesday March 8, 2022 to be included in the responses which go forward to the Bishops' Synod in 2023.



The ten questions are to be considered by parishes as the Diocese embarks on the Synodal Pathway are:

- 1 How welcoming is our parish?
- 2 How good are we at listening?
- 3 How good are we at communicating?
- 4 How well does the Church's liturgy inspire a deeper encounter with the Risen Lord?
- 5 How well do I understand and participate in the mission of the Church?
- 6 How well do we engage with the wider world?
- 7 How good is our relationship with other Christian traditions?
- 8 How well do we work as a team in our parish?
- 9 How open are we to the will of God and the guidance of the Holy Spirit?

10 How well do we hand on the faith?

King's Lynn Foodbank Project Manager's Report:

What's happened this year?

2021 was another busy year, although thankfully not as busy as 2020! We fed over 4300 people over the last year and although we've had peaks and troughs, they have not been quite as marked as 2020. In January and February, we fed well over 500 people. However, things settled down and our average

between April and October was 273 per month and then rose again to a peak of 485 in December.

Anecdotally, the lower numbers seem to be due to the £20 uplift to Universal Credit, implemented at the beginning of the first Covid lockdown, and the support that families received through Free School Meal support during the school holidays. However, once the uplift went, combined with a rise in energy prices, we've seen an increase in numbers again which we expect to continue in the coming months.

This year, we have had the support of our own CAB adviser to whom we can refer Foodbank clients for support in resolving their crisis with the aim of ending their need for Foodbank parcels. Of the clients that have been referred directly by us, only 10% have returned for further food parcels which shows the impact that this has.

What of the Future?

The Trussell Trust has fully moved to a vision of ending the need for foodbanks in the future. The work that we've done with our CAB worker has fit into this vision well and we are now looking towards either buying in services from other organisations and/or employing our own sign-poster in order to ensure that our clients are able to access the support and guidance needed to work themselves out of crisis and end their need for Foodbank support.

It feels as if King's Lynn Foodbank is at a key point in its history. 2021 marked the 10th anniversary since the foodbank opened its doors and the focus has hitherto, rightly, been on ensuring that people in financial crisis are fed. I believe that the next ten years will focus on ensuring that whilst people continue to be fed, that the causes of their crises are resolved so that we can end the need for food support.

Finally, I would like to thank everyone who supports King's Lynn Foodbank – without your support through prayer and through donations of food and money, the foodbank simply would not be able to serve the people of King's Lynn. Thankyou.

Debt Centre - Report:

CAP Kings Lynn Debt Centre has 2 Debt coaches providing in-home appointments to people in Kings Lynn and surrounding areas- Emily and Laura. We are starting to see more clients reach out for help as we enter into January. If you know of anyone

struggling with debt, we encourage you to have them call our freephone number **0800 328 0006**. We are continuing to see clients go debt free, and it is particularly encouraging to see clients who have been on their journey for 3+ years on a Debt repayment plan now go debt free. It is such an achievement for them to finally reach the end of their journey after faithfully paying off their debts. We will get to celebrate with them when they get that Debt Free phone call.

Volunteer Teams: We have been focusing on increasing our volunteer teams. We are promoting 2 teams: **Visits team** for those who come along to appointments with Emily & Laura. We aim to encourage and befriend the clients we are meeting as they progress through their journey out of debt. We run different courses throughout the year: The well-being journey, Alpha, Jesus is ____.

Our other **volunteer team** is our course team. Volunteers on this team attend the course with clients, help with refreshments and encouraging our clients. If anyone in your congregations is interested in joining our volunteer teams, contact Emily 07495 017364. We hold a monthly prayer gathering if anyone would like to join us to pray into the work of the debt centre, we hold this on the 2nd Wednesday of every month at The King's Centre from 12-1pm. Our next prayer meeting is Wednesday 9th March.

Christian Aid: The Christian Aid group have had a good response to the sale of their recipe books and have covered their costs. 2 weeks ago, they showed the film 'Thanks for the Rain'. The film was shot in Kenya and is about climate change.

Christian Aid Week this year will be Sunday 15th - Saturday 21st May. The Christian Aid Quiz will be held on Friday, 6th May 2022 at the London Road Methodist Church.

Night Shelter: As of 4th January, 19 guests had been welcomed, including 4 women (for comparison we welcomed 23 guests over the 5-month season in

2020-21). Of the 10 who have moved out, 6 have gone to supported move-on accommodation, 2 to private rentals, 1 has returned to rough sleeping, 1 to sofa surfing. There has been one eviction of a guest who subsequently returned and is making good progress. On 4th November the Night Shelter was fully occupied with no waiting list of rough sleepers, though a number of individuals are known to be in other temporary accommodation e.g., B&Bs.

As of 28th December, 63 people had presented at the door for food, shelter or other assistance or support, of whom 14 were seeking accommodation. All people asking for accommodation are referred to BCKLWN (Council) Housing if the Night Shelter does not have space. There has been a noticeable change in response from Housing in being willing to offer alternative emergency accommodation since an individual, a veteran from the armed forces, who had approached us for help and been referred to Housing was very sadly found deceased on 14th November sleeping rough in St John's churchyard.

The Night Shelter continues to support all guests to resolve homelessness and liaises closely with a number of partner agencies. The Council is again this winter operating the "Pods" in addition to B&Bs as parallel emergency accommodation; the hope is for the most vulnerable individuals to come to the Night Shelter. This, though, can be complicated since some Night Shelter guests need to stay for extended periods of time due to a number of barriers to housing, including substance misuse, immigration status or other complex needs.

We were pleased to hold two further volunteer recruitment evenings in January, and hope to hold a further evening in the early spring. Enquiries about volunteering are always welcome.

Call the Midwife: A very successful 'Call the Midwife' event at the Guildhall on Saturday 15th January raised £4493.27 for the Night Shelter. The Night Shelter is holding a fundraising day at the Bishop's Garden in Norwich on Sunday 22nd May, 1pm-4:30pm - friends from Churches Together especially welcome.

In early December 2021 the Night Shelter received an excellent rating after an inspection by Housing Justice on 1st November.



Volunteering with Citizens Advice

Citizens Advice are in need of volunteer advisers to help in their King's Lynn office on Mondays and Thursdays, and a receptionist to help on Mondays. Susan, who runs the King's Lynn branch, is fantastic and they support the work of the Foodbank brilliantly, but they're very stretched at present.

Centuries-old Marian icon offers solace, protection amid horror of war



As Ukrainians turn to their faith amid the ongoing tragedy of Russia's invasion of their nation, many who follow both the Orthodox and Catholic traditions will look to an unusual icon of Mary as a symbol of the solace they seek.

In some news photos, clergy are seen holding the icon, which depicts Mary holding a long piece of fabric in her outstretched hands.

This sacred image is known in Ukraine and many other East European nations as the "Pokrova," or the Intercession of the Theotokos, "mother of God" in Greek, a title for Mary used in both Eastern Orthodox and Byzantine Catholic churches.

The Pokrov icon has its origins in a 10th-century Marian apparition that occurred in Constantinople, according to Sarah Cahalan, director of the Marian Library at the University of Dayton in Ohio.

Orthodox tradition states that on Oct. 1 in the year 911, Mary appeared to St. Andrew the Fool for Christ during a vigil held at the city's Church of St. Mary of Blachernae Church.

The saint said he saw Mary spreading her cloak — some accounts say it was her veil — over the congregation as a symbol of her protection. At the time the city was under attack and according to tradition, after Mary's appearance the attacking armies withdrew.

After the Pokrov apparition, the image of Mary holding her veil or cloak became associated with protection from war and natural disasters among Eastern Christians, and Prince Yaroslav the Wise placed Ukraine and its people under the protection of the Pokrov in 1037.

Cahalan noted the Pokrova is one of many Marian icons significant to Ukrainian Christians, both Catholic and Orthodox.

Devotion to Mary is an intrinsic part of both Orthodox and Catholic spirituality in the Ukraine, according to Father Silviu Bunta, an Orthodox priest from Romania and professor of Scripture at the University of Dayton.

He said churches of the Orthodox Church, the most common form of Christianity in Ukraine, have many titles for Mary, ranging from "Theotokos" to protectress and champion for people on earth.

"We Orthodox call her by many titles, including 'More Honorable than the Cherubim' because to us, she is the greatest person who ever lived and will ever live," Father Bunta told Catholic News Service.

"She's the ultimate mediator for us in times of trouble because she was 100% human like we are and now can mediate for us in the heavens," he said. "We in the Orthodox Church would immediately go to her in any time of distress."

Father Bunta said the Pokrov icon can often be seen on display in both Orthodox and Byzantine Catholic churches, and Orthodox churches throughout Eastern Europe celebrate a feast day associated with it on Oct. 1, with special prayer services and processions.

The Pokrova icon, because of its origin in a time of siege and war, would be a natural one for Ukrainians to contemplate during this difficult time, Father Bunta said.

He said the icon would likely also be on display at any Orthodox or Catholic churches in the nation that might offer a special Eastern-rite service for people in crisis and distress called a "Service of Paraklesis."

Cahalan said the Pokrova is just one example of devotion to Mary in a country or culture after she has intervened during a time of strife. She noted that during World War II, there were accounts of Greek soldiers who reported seeing Mary holding a protective veil, an echo of the Pokrov apparition.

When immediate victory is not possible, Mary also is a vital source of solace and hope for those who are suffering, partly because she experienced so much suffering during her own life in having to experience the persecution and crucifixion of her Son.

"She offers protection and, when protection is not possible, she offers comfort to the persecuted and the marginalized," Cahalan said.

As examples, she described photos in the library's collection of rosaries confiscated from migrants at the border between the U.S. and Mexico, who had carried them in order to have a source of prayer and a sign of their faith as they travelled.

She also mentioned the apparitions of Mary at Kibeho, Rwanda, which many of the faithful believe predicted the genocide that tore apart that nation in the 1990s and since has become an important devotion for Catholics who are part of the Rwandan diaspora.

Mary is a comforter in difficult times because she is both an intercessor and has a perspective on our human struggles because she lived life on earth and experienced the same struggles, Father Bunta said.

"We should turn to her not just as someone who intervenes, but also someone who has lived our life," he said. "Mary lived here on earth and has carried God in her womb, and because of that she contains everything in our lives.

"Even when we have a sense of abandonment, estrangement and hopelessness, we can turn to her because through her life she has contained everything and can offer comfort like no one else."




FLOWER FESTIVAL


